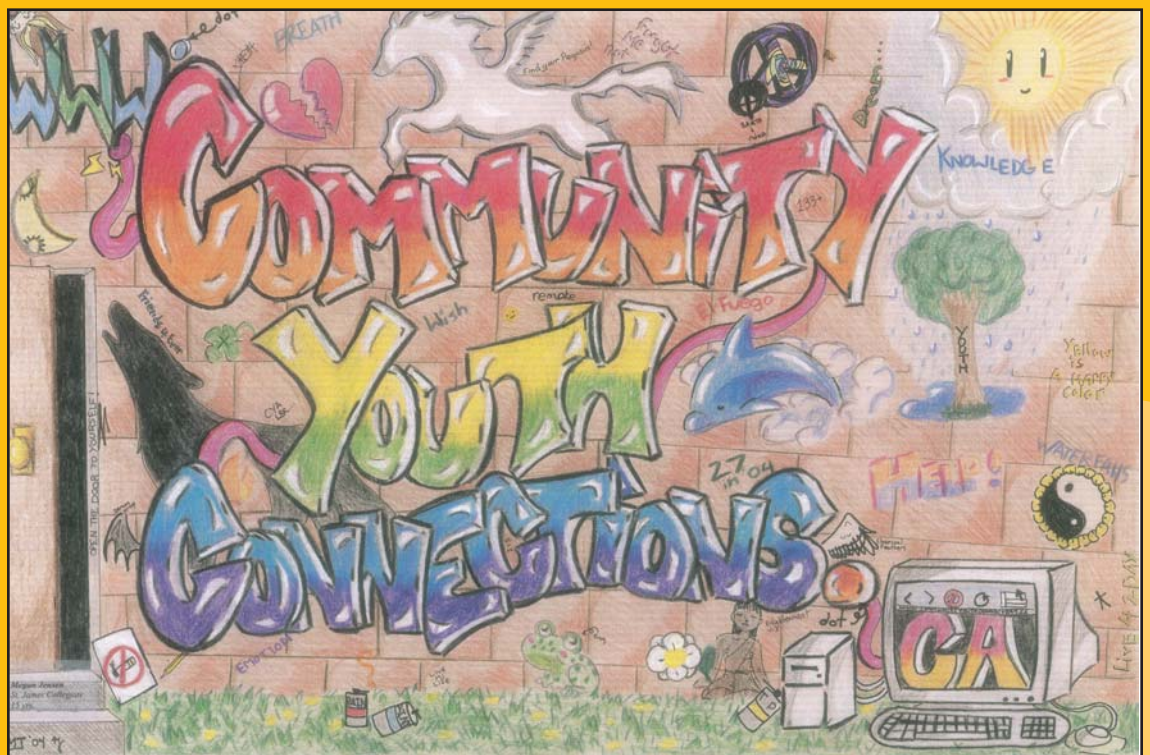


Annual Report 2004

Our Purpose

The Winnipeg Committee for Safety was created to support, assist, stimulate and mobilize the work of Winnipeg's neighbourhoods on safety concerns.

The Winnipeg Committee for Safety (WCFS) is community based and community driven. Approximately 20 people volunteer their time to encourage safety. Representatives from the Winnipeg Police Service, Community Services, Manitoba Justice, and the City Clerk's Department are also represented on the committee.

- linked youth with accurate information and up-to-date help available from local resources. Most importantly, it allows them to do so anonymously.
- developed a wallet sized **Youth Crisis Resource Card** listing many of these same agencies and resources our teens can turn to when seeking help for youth who do not have a computer.

Conflict Resolution Training Committee

We provided free Conflict Resolution Training facilitated by Quartet Consulting on the weekend of June 12 & 13.

Training was available to groups and individuals actively involved with safety initiatives in their communities. Participants received certificates for completing this training workshop.

Although a weekend workshop did not appeal to everyone, Manitoba Housing decided to contact Quartet Consulting to conduct a training workshop for their staff as a result of our workshop.

Restorative Justice Week 2004

WCFS participated in this annual event which takes place during Manitoba's Crime Prevention Month every November. Federal statistics revealed that:

- the new Youth Criminal Justice Act discourages locking up children in prison facilities;
- Corrections Service of Canada has indicated 60% of crime occurs between people who have some prior relationship;
- Manitoba (Winnipeg) has the second highest rate of incarcerating children in Canada;
- it is the opinion of WCFS that it is extremely important to pursue the application of the restorative justice framework to address youth crime in neighbourhoods, which includes developing youth programming to ensure youth are participating in constructive, rather than destructive activities.

Our Activities in Progress

- hosting our annual Neighbourhood Forum Safety: The Challenge! on Saturday, April 23, 2005, at R.B. Russell High School. The Neighbourhood Forum promotes safer communities and has keynote speakers, information booths, and workshops on: community safety; drug and gang awareness; non-violent crisis intervention; conflict resolution; bullying; and more...
- presenting the WCFS Safety Audit/Activity Awards to those involved in safety improvements and activities for everyone in the community. These Awards empower people to take direct action on safety issues in their own neighbourhoods. The Award categories are: Community Safety Award; Safety Audit Teamwork Award; and Community Building Safety Award.

Downtown Winnipeg Committee For Safety

Aggressive Panhandling Related Initiatives

- The Downtown Winnipeg committee for Safety (DWCFS) partnered with the Downtown Winnipeg BIZ to discuss proposed changes, and alternatives, to the Obstructive solicitation By-law, and how these aggressive panhandling issues reflect on our City's efforts for rejuvenating downtown.

MTS Centre Safety & Security

- The DWCFS partnered with City departments and downtown property owners to coordinate a safe and comfortable opening strategy for the MTS Centre.

Weather Protected Walkway System

- In cooperation with safety and security stakeholders along the Weather Protected Walkway System, the DWCFS participated in a comprehensive study of this system. The group provided feedback outlining existing conditions within the system, and recommended changes to improve the safety and comfort of walkways users. Five key recommendations were adopted by Council on May 19, 2004.

- upgrading our new youth website by developing four separate three minute video clips on joyriding (stealing cars); sexually exploited youth; gangs; and alcohol and drugs. The video clips will contain information about these topics as well as interviews with youth who have been adversely affected by these issues.
- conducting youth safety meetings to promote the development of Youth Safety Councils in Winnipeg. Meetings have been held with youth at Turtle Island Neighbourhood Centre; Chalmers Community Club; and, Broadway Neighbourhood Community Centre.
- participating in the Lord Selkirk Park Community Advisory Committee. Meetings, community patrolling, and a summer barbecue was held to encourage residents to become involved in neighbourhood safety. A result of these activities is the establishment of a COPPS program in the area.
- chairing the Central Youth Justice Committee of central downtown Winnipeg. Currently considering a restorative justice framework to address youth crime in neighbourhoods on a proactive, preventative basis.
- assisting in the development of a new Neighbourhood Resource Network of neighbourhoods across the city established by the Winnipeg Regional Health Authority.
- expanding a library of safety information accessible to the public through the WCFS's website and CDs.
